ACTING PRINCIPALS REPORT

Welcome back

I hope everyone had a chance to enjoy a break and some winter activities. I spent a lot of time at the aquatic centre with my children, feeding the swans and playing on the playground at Lake Wendouree and heading to Melbourne to see the Dons have a couple of wins.

COVID Guidelines

As we continue to move towards the cold and flu season, I thought I would just provide a reminder of the COVID guidelines that have been in place since January of this year. Previously, the COVID guidelines provided to schools was approximately 30 pages in length, it is now 3 pages.

COVID positive cases

Students who report a positive result are recommended to isolate for a minimum of 5 days and not attend school until their symptoms have resolved. Students who isolate as a result of a positive COVID-19 test should be supported in the same way as students with an extended absence due to illness or injury.

Parents or carers should complete the Student COVID-19 <u>COVID Test Portal</u> if a student tests positive to COVID-19 (via a PCR or rapid antigen test). Where a parent/carer informs the school by phone or written notification, the school should complete the Schools COVID Case Management System.

Infection prevention and control

All staff, students and visitors to schools should practise good hand hygiene, particularly on arrival to school, before and after eating, after blowing their nose, coughing, sneezing or using the toilet. Staff should direct or supervise young students where required.

As a school we actively promote preferred hygiene practices, provide and use hand sanitiser and have air purifiers and each learning space.

Face masks

Staff and students who wish to wear a face mask should be supported to do so, and schools should continue to make face masks available for staff, students and visitors.

The Department of Health recommends that masks should be worn by a person who is a close contact of someone who has tested positive for COVID-19 when leaving home.

Additionally, the Department of Health recommends that masks should be worn by a person who has COVID-19 for at least 7 days after a positive test when they need to leave home.

Professional learning

Late last term, we commenced our professional learning journey with Educational Consultant-Bron Ryrie Jones. Ultimately, building our capacity to be the best educators we can for the children of MBPS. We collaborated with Canadian Lead Primary School and Mount Pleasant Primary School to embed responsive teaching routines. The room

was full of expertise and positive energy as we revisited the science of how we learn, and current evidence based best teaching practices. This is a year-long collaboration, and we look forward to having everyone at MBPS next term. This continues are commitment to evidence based best practice and professional learning to enhance our capacity.

Planning days

Towards the end of each term, CRTs (Casual Relief Teachers) and I take classes to enable the Years F-2 and Years 3-6 Planning Days to take place.

Planning Days occur at the end of each term and ensure staff are resourced with dedicated and privileged time to develop the reading and math units the students engage with each term. This also ensures a thoroughly sequenced and planned curriculum is implemented across the school.

As part of the Victorian Government Schools Agreement, staff are allocated one day out of the classroom each semester to complete work related to their duties. Last term, many teachers used this time to complete 1:1 assessment with students.

On these days, we are fortunate to have such reliable and capable CRTs to continue the classroom programs in place. Also ably supported by our wonderful educational support staff.

Lunchtime Clubs have commenced for another term! Board games today. The kids had a great time. Thank you, Mr. Nettelbeck! Art/Craft Club will also continue with Mrs. Ackland.



Raphael Ryder Cheshire International Centre (for the relief of suffering)



Last term, I was fortunate enough to present at the Ryder Cheshire Australia Biennial Conference. Mount Blowhard Primary School being one of three schools in the Ballarat area that sponsor a child and support the Raphael Ryder Cheshire International Centre.

I provided an overview of our involvement and a presentation of images from our annual Mount Hollowback. Ryder Cheshire expressed their gratitude for our support, mentioned what a wonderful community event it is and how grateful they are that we donate all monies raised (generally around \$700), even though the cost of sponsoring Sushma is less than \$100. The additional funds support the Raphael Ryder Cheshire International Centre.

Sushma has a sever intellectual disability and is in a pre-vocational class at Raphael. She is being trained in daily living skills, social and communication skills and some functional academic skills. She has an older sister who is pursuing the teacher training programme at Raphael.


